


















How to Play

Before playing, you will need to print and cut apart each board and calling card. Students may enjoy coloring the bingo cards and boards. For added durability, ask students to glue each board and card onto oaktag or cardboard, then laminate them. Use beans or colored chips as tokens. Note: Students can play in groups of eight, or as a whole class using duplicate boards with multiple winners.

Ask students to elect one child to take the role of card caller, or you can have students take turns reading the cards. The caller should shuffle the cards and place the stack facedown. Next, the caller should take the top card and read the English or Spanish word, or both. Once the card is read, players should look at their boards to see if they have a match. If a match is made, players should place a token on their board. Play continues in this fashion until a player gets three in a row, either vertically, horizontally, or diagonally. Upon achieving three in a row, a child should shout "Bingo!" or "Bilingual Bingo!" The student who shouts out first must then read each English and Spanish word from the winning set. If the child reads all words correctly, he or she wins the game!
